- **Mini-Task:** Get creative together and encourage your children to share your projects with family and friends.

- **Prayer:** Pray with the spirituality of the Partners in Faith saints. Invite your child or children to help lead your family in prayer.
- **Missionary Discipleship:** Reflect on the questions and take turns sharing your experiences.

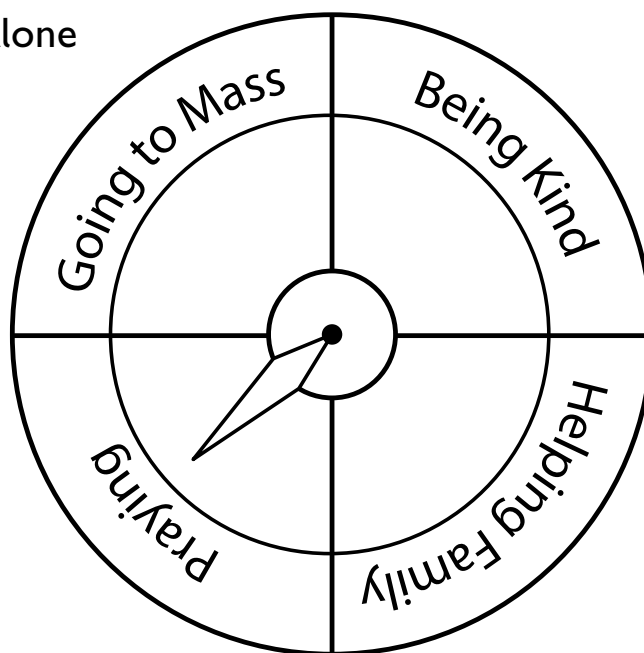
What Makes Us Catholic?

The Liturgy of the Hours always includes praying psalms. These are beautiful and ancient prayers from the Bible. When we say or sing the psalms, we are following Jesus' example of prayer. For the Liturgy of the Hours, the source of the psalms is from a book called the Psalter. The Psalter arranges the psalms in a special order according to the time of day and the liturgical season. The psalms help us to praise God through the many seasons of the Catholic Church.

What Makes Us Catholic?

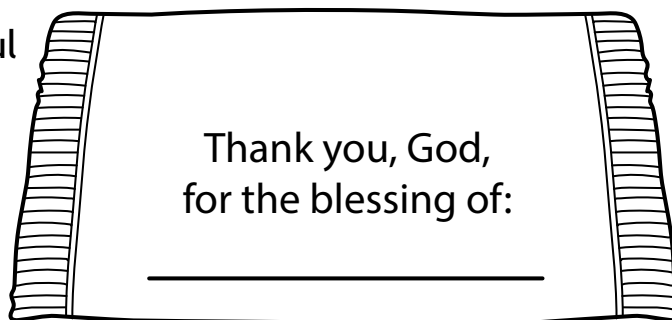
We know from Scripture that we are “wonderfully made” and that each of us reflects God. Jesus himself took on our human life in the Incarnation. The Incarnation reminds us of our innate human dignity, as we are made in the image and likeness of God. Being made in God's image and likeness is the basis of the Church's teaching that all life is sacred, from the moment of conception to natural death. When a woman is pregnant, the Church prays: “God, author of all life, / bless, we pray, this unborn child; / give constant protection” (*Rite for the Blessing of a Child in the Womb*).



Mini-Task

God's creation gives us the food we eat. Food makes our bodies strong and healthy. A lot of people work to bring God's gifts to our tables.

When we gather to eat, we can inspire others to be closer to God. Make a plan for a Gift-of-God table mat. List on your mat blessings you are thankful for. Then write ways you can show your thanks to God for those who prepared your meal.



At Home

As a family, pray one of the prayers in this lesson. In the morning, say: "God, thank you for this new day." When you need help, pray: "Be with us, Lord." Allow each member of your family a turn to lead the prayer.

SESSION 3

Do Acts of Love

What Makes Us Catholic?

The Holy Spirit prepares us to receive the grace of the sacraments. But we prepare ourselves to celebrate the sacraments themselves as well. If we have committed a serious sin, we must celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation before we celebrate the Eucharist. We do not eat or drink anything except water or medicine for one hour before we receive the Eucharist. Before we celebrate Confirmation, we choose a Confirmation name and a sponsor, celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and perform works of service. This preparation means our hearts and minds are clear, open, and ready to receive the grace of each sacrament.

Members of the society run thrift stores and food pantries that help to clothe and feed people in need. The society's House in a Box® program brings household items to people after a natural disaster. Whatever the need, members bring compassion and care to others. The Society of St. Vincent de Paul is active in more than four thousand communities in the United States.

SESSION 5

Grow in Love for God

Teresa was holy, intelligent, and lively; she loved music, dance, good conversation, and good books.

What Makes Us Catholic?

Sometimes it is hard to ask God for what we need. Yet even Jesus prayed to his Father when he needed help. As Catholics, when we pray to God for our needs, we show that we know we need *him*. We can pray to God in Jesus' name for help, for mercy, and for healing. We can also pray for good things to happen in our lives. There is no limit to our prayers. As pope, Saint John Paul II said: "Remember that you are never alone: Christ is with you on your journey every day of your lives! He has called you and chosen you to live in the freedom of the children of God. Turn to him in prayer and in love."

In this lesson, you learned that there are many ways to pray. These different ways of praying offer us opportunities to pray every day, anywhere.

SESSION 6

Receive God's Love and Grace

Partners in Faith

Saint Ignatius of Loyola

Saint Ignatius was a Spanish soldier. He was badly hurt when he was hit by a cannonball. While he was recovering, he read about Jesus and the saints. Eventually he founded the religious order called the Jesuits. He helped people know God with his book called *Spiritual Exercises*. Saint Ignatius wrote prayers and reflections that we still use. The first Jesuit to be pope was Pope Francis.

What Makes Us Catholic?

Our Church understands that we receive different kinds of grace from God. *Sanctifying grace* is a permanent gift we receive to help us be holy and share in God's life. *Actual grace* is a temporary gift that helps us understand what to do in situations as they are happening. It tells us how to act as God wants and make the right decisions according to his will for us. *Actual grace* gives us the strength to turn away from sin. *Sacramental grace* is the grace we receive in the sacraments. Each sacrament gives us its own particular grace.





Mini-Task

The Communion of Saints reminds us that we are always connected to our brothers and sisters in faith. The Litany of the Saints is a prayer for the intercession of the saints. It includes a list or “litany” of many canonized saints and martyrs.

SESSION 7

Share the Good News

Partners in Faith

Saint Dominic

Saint Dominic was born in Spain. He lived about the same time as Saint Francis of Assisi. When he was about 25 years old, he became a priest. Several years later, he and six other priests began traveling around and preaching the Gospel. They became known as the Order of Preachers. Today, we call them Dominicans, after Saint Dominic. Dominic said that it was important to study and pray as well as to preach.

What Makes Us Catholic?

The Church's sacraments help us to respond to God's grace and grow in virtue. They strengthen us to share God's love with the world. For example, the Sacrament of Confirmation strengthens the gifts of the Holy Spirit within us to "spread and defend the faith by word and action" (CCC, 1303). The Eucharist "strengthens our charity, which tends to be weakened in daily life" (CCC, 1394). Celebrating the sacraments boosts our ability to give the best of ourselves—to live virtuous lives.



Mini-Task

We pray to thank God for the many gifts in our lives and to ask for blessings for the days ahead. As a family, you may pray together most often at mealtimes.

Ask if you can pray in a new way at mealtime. After saying grace, go around the table, giving time for all family members to say how they will share in the mission of Jesus Christ.

God calls all families to be a light to the world. Talk with your family members about ways your family can be a light to the world. Suggested ways to shine a light can be praying for those in need, sharing God's joy with other families, and serving families who need food and clothing.

Leader: Saint Dominic believed that through a life of prayer, study, preaching, and community, we would be able to live his prayer: “We must sow the seed, not keep it for ourselves.” He lived so that others might know and understand God’s presence. By doing small things in Christ’s name, we can change the world. We, too, become evangelists!

Let us listen to how Jesus’ love and presence is made known through modern evangelists among us. Listen to the stories of missionary disciples among us.

Leader: Let us pray:
Lord Jesus, help us to know you in our daily lives. We want to be living witnesses of your love for us and to be evangelists! Teach us to live just as Saint Dominic taught us to share your love in our world.

SESSION 8

Bring Jesus to the World

Partners in Faith

Mary, Mother of God

God chose Mary to be the mother of Jesus. Mary is our mother, too. When we need help, we can pray to Mary. When we pray to Mary, we are asking her to talk to Jesus for us.

What Makes Us Catholic?

Hopeful, joyful prayer is an important part of Catholic prayer life. When we pray the Rosary, for example, we can meditate on the joyful events in the lives of Jesus and Mary.

The five Joyful Mysteries are: the Annunciation, the Visitation, the Nativity, the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple, and the Finding of Jesus in the Temple. As we celebrate each mystery, we think about what it means to us. And we pray that others experience the joy of Jesus' presence in their lives.

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At Home

Prayer

Dear Jesus, we know how much you love us. We can see it in all of creation and in the faces of those who love and care for us. Help us to feel your love.

Leader: Dear Jesus, we know that you want us to love each other. Help us to say a word that will make others feel loved. Help us to share your love.

Leader: Dear Jesus, you smiled at your Mother, Mary, when you told her you loved her. Help us to smile at our family members when we tell them we love them. Help us to share your love.

All: Help us to share your love.
